Collegial interchange, not isolation, must become the norm for teachers. Communities of learning can no longer be considered utopian; they must become the building blocks that establish a new foundation for America's schools."

To this end, across the country, education service agencies like Hamilton County Educational Service Center in Cincinnati, Ohio, and Riverside County Office of Education

When Bob Graham became governor of Florida, his wife Adele was passionate about the importance of all school districts having an organized school volunteer program.

She recognized the value in all districts—large and small, urban and rural—having staff and financial resources committed to recruiting, training, and recognizing volunteers.

To promote her vision for strong school volunteer programs, Mrs. Graham persuaded the governor and his legislative leaders to provide resources to fund organized school volunteer programs. She continued her advocacy when Governor Graham became a United States senator.

As Adelle Graham demonstrated sustained, passionate support for school volunteer programs; so, too, do the recipients of the Adele Graham Award, which is presented annually to recognize an individual district volunteer coordinator who has given tirelessly to build the statewide school volunteer program infrastructure that Florida enjoys today.

AESA member Rick Everitt of the Panhandle Area Education Consortium in Chipley, Florida, received the Adele Graham Award in 2007 for his long resume of leadership in education. He joined the Florida school volunteer effort in 1983 as coordinator for Washington County District School Volunteer and Senior Mentors for Creative Students. Today, he boasts the longest tenure on the Florida Commissioner of Education's Community Involvement Council.

Rick has long advocated for legislative funding for Florida's district school volunteer program. As early as 1990, when the concept of supporting school volunteer programs was first becoming popular with the state legislature, he was working as a volunteer advocate for the statewide school volunteer program.
