In 1976, Dr. Walter G. Turner worked toward creating a national organization that would impact Federal legislation and promote the value of ESAs. Now, more than 25 years later, Secretary Rod Paige's vision and leadership has opened the door for ESAs to be recognized as vital links in state and national efforts to take students to the highest levels of academic achievement.

As a visionary school reformer, Dr. Paige is creating a culture of achievement, improving student performance, developing safe schools, and enhancing the quality of education. He was instrumental in passage of the No Child Left Behind Act, the most fundamental reform of Federal education

policy in history. By directly utilizing ESAs and AESA, he is making sure that "no child is left behind."

The Walter G. Turner Award recognizes contributions in the advancement of educational service agency programs.

For more than 10 years, Dr. Fielder has been in the forefront of activities that have promoted and supported ESAs. While serving on the AESA council, he stood out as a member whose ideas consistently pushed the agency into areas of service that were previously not considered.

Seizing upon opportunities for collaboration and capacity building, Dr. Fielder has virtually catapulted area education agencies into major roles in the Iowa educational system and in community planning. Through his leadership and solid relationships with state entities, the Iowa Legislature passed a bill establishing an accreditation process for Iowa's area education agencies that

firmly positions AEAs as the leader in school improvement for the state's educational system.

Dr. Christiansen initiated *Perspectives*, the AESA journal of research and opinion about educational services agencies.

Most recently, Dr. Christiansen spent a year sorting, analyzing, and gathering AESA history to prepare a document entitled, *History—Association of Educational Service Agencies.* The publication was a gift to the AESA membership on its 25th anniversary and remains a valuable resource for understanding the history and importance of ESAs. *The E. Robert Stephens Award recognizes research, writing, and/or publishing information that advances the understanding of ESAs.*

Court overturns requirements affecting libraries

three-judge panel of the US District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania ruled on May 21, 2002, that Sections 1712(a) (2) and 1721(b) of the Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA) (applying to libraries) are facially invalid under the First Amendment and permanently enjoined the government from enforcing those provisions. The court found unconstitutional section 254(h) (6), which set out a requirement that a library receiving E-rate discounts have a technology protection measure for its computers with Internet access. Thus, public libraries receiving E-rate discounts are not required to filter their computers with Internet access.

It is important to note that the decision did not address CIPA requirements as they apply to schools. Those requirements remain in full force and effect, and schools will continue to be required to meet CIPA requirements as spelled out in the FCC regulations in order to receive funds from the Schools and Libraries Universal Service Support Mechanism.

AESA/Microsoft software grant program enters second year with much to celebrate

he AESA/Microsoft Software Grant Program is entering its second year with much to celebrate. Last year, more than 55 grant applications were received and awarded. Computer labs in over 150 educational service agencies—housing over 5,000 computers—received free training software. This year, grant recipients will receive computer software and support materials applicable for K-12 classroom learning, management, and curriculum development, and the licenses to use the software in dedicated teacher training labs (physical or mobile).

Holly M. Jobe, the IMS director at the Montgomery County Intermediate Unit (MCIU) in Pennsylvania says, "Our three training labs (PC, Mac, and mobile) now have current versions of software as a result of this program. Through the grant MCIU was able to create state-of-the-art technology professional development facilities to provide a quality program using software that is being shipped with new machines. As a public entity that depends on state and school district contributions for funding, keeping the latest versions of software in the training labs is a challenge. This grant provided us with resources to maintain pace with our school clients."
